

WHEN TO GO

Sub-tropical climate. Two distinct climatic zones - East is wet, West dry, a mix of weather zones on the central plateaux. The Rainy season from November to April, dry season runs from May -October. Jan - March is the cyclone season.





PACKING

Light layers of clothing in neutral colours. Bright coloured clothing is not suitable for walking safari. Packing checklist: Layers - long and short sleeve shirts and trousers | Warm fleece or jumper for cooler evenings | Waterproof jacket | Comfortable, sturdy shoes | Flip-flops / sandals Swimming attire | hat/baseball cap | Sunglasses & Sun-cream | Personal items - toiletries, small medical kit etc | Torch, plug adapters and charging equipment | Binoculars and camera | Books etc for siesta time

KEY REGIONS

Lusaka is Zambia's capital and is a really vibrant city for those who want to get a flavour for modern African city culture, which is often much missed by visitors, and is very much worth a 'decompression' stop before or after safari.

Zambia has a huge amount to offer with 20 National Parks throughout including:

LOWER ZAMBEZI NATIONAL PARK

The Zambezi is the 4th largest river in Africa and the safari experiences focus on and around the river, where the game gravitates. All of the camps and lodges are set along the river. The river combined with a northerly escarpment concentrates game in the area, and much of that, within 5km of the river. Activities are both land and river based and often arrival at a camp will be by river which is very memorable. The game is not as diverse as in other Zambian parks but there are huge populations of the game there is – big herds of elephant, buffalo, impala and good for predators like leopard and lion. There is of course excellent fishing.

SOUTH LUANGWA

One of the continent's great unspoilt wilderness, which boasts a huge variety of species, with some animals which are endemic. Accommodation comprises lodges combined with small remote bush-camps, with sleep-outs and hides on offer - and it is possible to walk from camp to camp. Again the Luangwa River itself is a defining feature of the safari experience, with river safaris offered in Emerald Season. The river is meandering leading to very fertile soil deposits which have a very high carrying capacity of game. Again, most camps are in close proximity to the Luangwa river. Unusually for a river of its size, it has never been dammed, so it's a very vibrant river following its natural seasonal cycle and variety. The area is well known for its population of leopard and wild dog.

KAFUE

Zambia's oldest and largest NP (formerly the largest in Africa) and still relatively underdeveloped for tourism. There is a large variety of mammals – (including more species of antelope than any other park in Africa). Guests can do balloon safaris over the Busanga Plains which offers an unforgettable perspective on the game below. The camps and small and remote, with some lovely new unusual options e.g. Green Safaris' 'birds' nest' camps.

LIVINGSTONE

The Victoria Falls are a natural phenomenon of global magnitude and significance and its inclusion in any Zambian itinerary is a must. There are some large hotels right at the top of the Falls themselves; with more private, smaller/boutique camps upstream of the Falls. In addition to their visual splendour the Falls offer lots of activities including microlight flights, bungee jumping, white water rafting, the Devils Pools, the Elephant Café, Livingstone Express and Livingstone Island.
